As we come to the end of the first full half term back this year, I'd like to take a moment to reflect on how brilliantly our children have stepped back into school life. Thanks to the unwavering support of all our staff, things really do look much more like 'normal', and we sincerely hope that next half term things will settle down even further. A quick thank you once again for supporting our classes with their Race for Life - at the last count, we had raised £2783.75, including Gift Aid, which is an incredible amount! Primary Quality Mark in Science

We are very proud to announce that Broadmayne is one of only 300 schools in the country to have been awarded the Primary Quality Mark in Science this year. Schools that achieve this award have to demonstrate a significant commitment to science teaching and learning, even during the challenging times that we have all recently been through. The assessors were looking for children engaging with great science both in and out of the classroom, developing positive attitudes towards science alongside secure scientific understanding. Despite obvious issues with lockdowns etc, we were congratulated in particular for how we developed scientific cultural capital in the school, through our links with outside organisations, strong family links and the range of professional development our staff have taken part in. Well done Mrs Stoker for leading the school through this-the assessors said "*Science subject leaders, their colleagues, their headteacher, children, parents and governors should be very proud.*"

Ticks

With the warm weather (hopefully!) approaching, the likelihood of children coming into contact with ticks becomes more likely. Ticks are small, and can vary in size from being as small as a tiny freckle, to the size of a baked bean. Ticks can be found across the UK, and survive in many different habitats, and we do occasionally find them in the school grounds. Ticks cannot fly, swim or jump. Current medical advice is that it is best practice for the school to remove a tick if we find one on your child - we will try and contact you to let you know if we are going to do this, and to discuss with you any further details, but if we cannot get hold of you we will remove the tick. To avoid ticks, the recommendations are that children wear long sleeves/trousers, which is not always practical in the summer, but we always ask children to wear these for if they will be visiting the



woods. There are also insect repellents that can deter ticks. If you require any further information, there are Public Health England leaflets available in the school foyer, or you can access the NHS guidance here: <https://www.nhs.uk/conditions/lyme-disease/>
